# A Passion for Orchids

Flouder 2000 Talk

Orchids are widely cultivated in homes, gardens and commercial nurseries. Hawaii, the big island is also called Orchid Isle, flowering orchids fill acres and acres. Several small species are native to Hawaii but man has introduced many of the orchids that flourish on the islands. Importing of orchids began in the 19th century, but orchids truly exploded with large-scale hybridization.

In Hawaii and around the globe, greenhouse experimentation created thousands of new cultivars. Today, with orchid hybridization a

well established science, the parentage of new breeds is carefully documented.

Although some consumers might be leery of growing orchid plants, their fears are unfounded. Caring for today's popular varieties is no more difficult than caring for most other potted plants. Most orchids originate in tropical or semitropical regions so these conditions must be duplicated.

Some orchids are easier to grow than others: Cattleya, Dendrobium, Oncidium and Phalaenopsis.

Another important thing to understand about orchids is that many genera are epiphytes – plants which live nonparasitically on other plants such as trees and bushes. Their long fleshy roots pull their nutrition requirements and water from rain, air and decaying plant material and dust and not from the soil.

Therefore, potted orchids require media other than earth to grow, such as bark chips, sphagnum moss, compost, terra cotta pieces, charcoal chips or a combination of the above. It is imperative that the chosen medium allows for good aeration of the plants' roots.

#### Tip:

A bent-neck rose is a sign that the bloom is not drawing enough water. To correct the problem, try re-cutting the stem a few inches with sharp shears or a knife while holding the stem end under water. Then, straighten the rose and lay in a tub of lukewarm water for about an hour, before returning to your arrangement.

## **Growing Your Orchids**

*Light:* Plenty of indirect light, western and southern exposures is good during fall and winter, but spring and summer sun is too strong.

*Temperature:* Daytime temperatures between 20 C and 23 C and nighttime temperature of 18 C is best. Nighttime temperature should always be lower and good air circulation without drafts is also important.

*Humidity:* In most indoor environments, additional humidity must be provided by using large bowls of water or water-filled pebble trays near or underneath orchid plants. However, do not let plants sit in water. *Water:* Most orchids prefer to be watered well rather than allowed to dry out. Variables such as pot size, planting medium, temperature and light should be considered.

*Nutrition:* Orchids grow better with fertilizer. However they do not tolerate high concentrations of regular fertilizers. The best option is to use a mix that is specially blended for orchids (20:5:10). Feeding should be suspended during the plant's rest period.

#### Hand-tied Bouquets



The hand-tied bouquet, the most popular European flower purchase, is simply flowers and foliage (freesia, alstroemeria, roses, salal, leather and asparagus) gathered in hand and tied with a piece of string. Just trim the stems and place the still-tied bouquet in a clean vase with floral food and fresh water.
